## Description of the work carried out during the STSM

During my Short Term Scientific Mission (STSM) to Universidad Nacional de Educación a Distancia (UNED) in Spain, I followed a plan to achieve the set objectives of fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange in the context of online language teaching programs. One of the primary activities during my STSM was to collaborate with experts at UNED and conduct a comprehensive needs analysis of online language teaching programs in both Turkey and Spain. Collaboration opportunities have been explored in detail during the STSM. Potential joint research projects were identified that focus on enhancing online language teaching, and we discussed avenues for resource sharing.

Planned Follow-Up Activities: Moving forward, the STSM paves the way for various follow-up activities for us; Firstly, SFL and UNED plan to initiate joint research projects in online language teaching, aligning with the STSM's objectives and the network's goals. Secondly, ongoing discussions will explore opportunities for sharing teaching materials, online platforms, and technological tools to enhance language instruction. Thirdly, the STSM's success encourages the development of structured exchange programs for students and faculty, facilitating crossinstitutional learning and collaboration. Fourthly, the connections established during the STSM are expected to lead to joint publications that share insights and best practices in online language teaching. Finally, future plans include participation in conferences or workshops related to online language teaching, both within the LITHME network and in expanded platforms.

In conclusion, the STSM at UNED has not only met its planned goals and expected outcomes but has also laid the groundwork for a robust and ongoing collaboration that aligns with the objectives of the LITHME Cost Action network. The experience has been mutually enriching and promises to yield long-term benefits for both institutions and the wider academic community in the field of online language teaching.
